

Margaret Zell OAM and Jill Blackman OAM: Queen's Birthday Honours 2021

The Queen's Birthday 2021 honours are awarded to people nominated by their peers who demonstrate achievement at a high level, make a contribution over and above what might be reasonably expected through paid employment, or whose voluntary contribution to the community stands out from others who have also made a valuable contribution.

Current and former Tooraweenah district residents are offering congratulations to Margaret Zell of Yoothamurra, and to Jill Blackman of Gundair, both received the OAM in the 2021 Queen's Birthday Honours. Margaret and Jill have each made a significant contribution to the Tooraweenah and Gilgandra districts since their marriages to local farmers, Don Zell and Sam Blackman respectively



After settling at Yoothamurra, Tooraweenah 64 years ago, Margaret became involved with the Tooraweenah Presbyterian Church, serving on the roster for many decades and as a member of the Women's Association, raising funds through catering to support church outreach programs locally and across Australia. She taught scripture at Tooraweenah Public School and in later years became the first and only female elder of her congregation. She became involved with the school P&C and helped on the tuck-shop while her children were in primary school.

With Don, Margaret played tennis at Tooraweenah and shared in working bees and fundraising to build the clubhouse and maintain the courts. During the 1960s Margaret led the Brownies who, along with Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and Cubs, met at the Tooraweenah Showground. Her training for this position ensured the groups continued for some years.

One of Margaret's great loves was Tooraweenah CWA, where she assisted with fundraising through catering for a range of events and functions. Funds were channelled back to the Tooraweenah community. With her love of cooking, Margaret entered many CWA cookery competitions and became a popular and skilled judge at other CWA branches and local shows. Her own cookery won many prizes at group level, culminating in winning one of the state sponge-baking finals held at Sydney Town Hall.

Margaret, aware of the plight of some district farmers, was a founding member of the Castlereagh Rural Advisory Group, which provided free, expert financial advice to farming families facing hardship from the late 1980s. Working on this committee, and later one in Coonamble, Margaret helped attract

federal, state and local government funding for its work and assisted in setting up networks of similar groups around the state. This service continues to this day.

Margaret also served as a founding editor of the Toora Bungles. She has been the recipient of many important awards for the thousands of hours of service she has gifted to groups and individuals in the Tooraweenah area. We wish her well as she enjoys a period of rest after so many years of devotion to the needs of others.More page 2

Community members are welcome to come along over the three days, as the event is fully catered, have a look and also attend the fittest horse and presentation on Sunday July 25th at approximately 9am.



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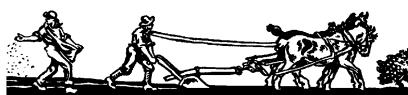
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Jill Blackman OAM Queens Birthday Honours



Jill received her OAM for her voluntary work in the Tooraweenah community and Gilgandra Shire over a period of almost 50 years. Jill acknowledged her reliance on the support of her late husband, Sam, and their three sons, as well as those who helped along the way. She has been very humbled by the experience and expressed her thanks to the people who took time to complete the nominations. Jill expressed belief that if people didn't volunteer, the world wouldn't be the same place. "I would certainly encourage young people to give it (volunteering) a try. We need you all, every single one of you," she said. One her most rewarding experiences was the Ride for Life, helping raise substantial funds for those suffering cancer and for a Dubbo based accommodation facility for those from isolated areas seeking cancer treatment. Apart from her continual commitment to this cause, most of Jill's other activities have spanned a considerable period of time. One of her greatest passions has been in the area of Mental Health. She was an Executive Member, Advocates for Mental Health Gilgandra Branch, Mental Health Association 2000-2011 and she is a carer representative on the Advisory Committee for the Centre for Rural and Remote Mental Health since 2013. Jill has been an editor of the Toora Bungles

community newsletter since 1995; Tooraweenah Show Secretary 1972-75; Show Steward since 1976, Secretary, Tooraweenah Public School P&C, circa 1983; Tooraweenah School Centenary, 1984; Secretary, Kookaburra Recruiting March Re-enactment 1986; Secretary Tooraweenah Endurance Riders 1988-1992; Tooraweenah CWA Member since 1985; Secretary/Public Relations, Tom Quilty National Endurance Championships, 1990-91; . As a volunteer or employee of Gilgandra Shire Council, Jill has been: Gilgandra Shire Meals on Wheels coordinator 2000-2005: Community Care Centre manager and coordinator 2005-2018; remains a meals on wheels volunteer; Deputy Mayor, 1990-91; 1994-5; 1997-8; Shire Councillor 1987-1999. Jill is a former Chair: North Western Regional Library Group; Explorer Country Tourism; Outback Tourism; Central West Regional Library Group. Pasture Information Field Day Friday 20th August 2021 Not To Be Missed!

If you are a livestock producer who would be keen to make the most out of your pastures then Friday the 20th of August is a date not to be missed.

The Tooraweenah Lions and Show Society combine to present a Pasture Information Field Day and fundraiser.

After years of continual setbacks caused by drought, COVID and mice, the information day will hopefully kill three birds with one stone by presenting some hard to come by pasture production information, raise some much needed community funds and bring like minded producers together for an informative and social day out.

Coordinated by the Central West Local Land Services, the day will highlight the latest research on exciting new grazing techniques, innovations and pasture varieties that are helping take our pasture production to a higher level in a rare time of good livestock prices and a reasonable seasons.

The day will consist of a talkfest during the morning session at the Tooraweenah Hall with premier experts in their field.

Then, a hearty Lions Club lunch, followed by a field trip in the afternoon, hopefully looking at some of the newer legume varieties, management techniques and where soil carbon fits into our individual

farming businesses.

The afternoon will end in time for parents to get to bus stops etc.

The day will be chaired by agronomist and pasture consultant Dr Dave Harbison from the NSW grasslands society.

Speakers will include well known local pasture agronomist Bob Freebairn who will draw on his 40+ years of local trials and experience and take us over the management must dos of native and tropical grass and the importance of a strong legume component to get the best out of our particular land types and pastures.

Bobs talk will lead into Dr Belinda Hackney who has been researching the latest legume varieties and trialling them in different areas and scenarios and has a knowledge of all things nitrogen.

Then Dr Susan Orgill, who's specialty and passion is soils, will speak on the complex issue of soil carbon, breaking this puzzling topic down to a level that we can all understand and benefit from. Later, Susan will be hands on in the field.

After each speaker there will be plenty of time for questions and discussion.

Also on hand will be well known farming and pasture agronomist Callen Thomson from the LLS who, if time permits, will give an

update on grazing strategies for this particular season and the current situation with the mice plague.

Kevin Watling from the Macquarie County Council will attend for producers who might have woody weed questions or issues.

With COVID problems during 2020, the Show Committee could not run their normal fundraising events and avenues for the Lions Club dried up, but the bills keep coming. So at this information day the idea is to charge \$40 per head for the day including lunch and morning tea.

Sponsorship is being sought from interested parties, all students will be free, and monies raised will go back into the Tooraweenah community.

So put your thinking caps on, jot down some curly questions that might make our presenters have to think, or identify then raise basic management problems you have encountered, but just put in the to hard basket.

Rarely do we get to have this much knowledge, research and experience in our own town, so come along and make the most of what will be an interesting and informative day and support your local community at the same time.

Hints From The Dog House! With Brendan Butler



Anyone who has been into a working woolshed, done yard work or helped or observed a

stock truck being loaded with sheep, would have to be impressed by the sight of an exceptional yard dog bouncing around on the sheep's backs, barking when asked and applying the right pressure to the stock to help make these jobs flow. While a lot of these better yard dogs have been bred and trained to be used in these full on situations our average Joe all-round work dogs can also usually be trained to be able to

ramp up in the yards, to back the sheep and bark on command. The key to getting a dog keen that may be a bit soft and unconvinced that the yard is a fun place to work is to bring them in gradually and slowly build their confidence by having them with or around us if possible, keeping them on a short leash as we move around in the yards to avoid having them get hurt or frightened, keeping any interaction with the sheep short and sharp so they don't lose interest and coaxing and praising them if they show interest. Maybe tying them near by so they can see and hear what's going on so they will be motivated to have a crack themselves, but mostly not putting them in a situation where they might get hurt or

can fail. If we take them into these pressure situations before they are ready and your dog gets trodden on or bashed by a cranky old ram than the next thing you know you will be trying to coax your dog out from under the house ,and a dog that was showing promise will not want to come near the yards. Pups and young bitches especially need patience and encouragement, so don't be in too big a rush to have your young dog firing to early in the yards until your confident that they can take a setback.

Next month we will look at a drill to teach a young dog to back sheep without getting hurt and losing confidence.

It is very exciting to see the veggies growing each week. Recently, Miss Sarah and Miss Shannon brought in items from their horses,



including saddles, stirrups, helmets, also photos, trophies and sashes from horse events to show the children, following their big interest in horses (and unicorns). 


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
