One of the organiser Brendon Butler advised the Toora Bungles the event will proceed at the first available opportunity.


When the event does go ahead, there will be plenty to discuss with the

Roads & Library Petitions — Elections — Cr Brian Mockler Reports!

Detailed report to Council's June meeting addressing Roads petition and measures proposed to better manage rural unsealed roads. Principles adopted apply roads hierarchy network and asset management condition assessment. Not exactly what the petition sought. Resolution to prioritise roads of strategic importance and to complete re-sheeting roads in their entirety before moving on to other roads of priority. Prime illustration is a commitment to re-sheet Hillside Road plus a further commitment for spot gravelling rectification works. Detail contained in Option B Council 29 June Business Paper. Capital Road and Urban Works Program report pages 14 to 18. Miller Street public toilet block petition urged Council to keep the existing toilet block for the convenience of residents and travelling public. Councillors resolved to reaffirm its support to demolish the existing toilets and replace them with new toilets as part of the

upgrades to the plaza as proposed in the DA. Having considered the matters referred to in the petition and submissions (summary articulated in pages 11-12 of the comprehensive DA analysis report to Council) Council resolution noted:

Extensive previous community and stakeholder consultation (my comment - as per comprehensive report to Council meeting on 20 April 2021)

That the Gil Library Hub and Plaza upgrade project involves relocation of the existing toilet block

That the demolition costs are fully funded without any cost to ratepayers

And that toilet facilities in the Plaza precinct will continue to remain for the convenience of residents and travelling public, with seating spaces enhanced.

Councillors considered the presentation by the proponents of the resolutions, no

Councillor spoke against the proposed resolutions, the Councillors vote determination was then 6 for with 2 against. The same vote determination 6 to 2 resulted in relation to the associated DA report recommendation for the whole development of the Gil Library Hub and Plaza. Again no councillor addressed the meeting opposing the DA report recommendations. Library plan and plaza sketch on pages 4a & 4b with toilet access marked!

<u>Council elections</u>, scheduled for the 4th of September have been postponed to the 4th December 2021 on the basis of advice from the NSW Electoral Commission and NSW Health due to the COVID 19 situation.

Candidate nominations will open on the 3rd November 2021 for those who wish to offer to contribute in a civic role on Gilgandra Shire Council.

A huge thank you to Ian and Jeanette, Bek and family for allowing us to have your family piano at preschool, on permanent loan, for the children (and Miss Marie) to enjoy. This was delivered to us during the holidays by a team: mainly several very strong and super helpful Preschool Dad's and a mate. We sincerely thank Matt Howard, Luke Jenkin, Ben Wykes. Benn Jenkin and Lachie for delivering the piano to preschool and a big thank you to Bek Howard, and Seanne Jenkin, for organising and overseeing such a mammoth task.

Everyone has been enjoying listening, singing and dancing to the music played on this piano by Miss Marie – it sounds a little different to the electric piano that we "borrowed" from Tooraweenah Public School and thank Mrs Smith and the School for this. Being an old piano, it is slightly higher than

more modern pianos, so if anyone has a piano stool for an old piano (with the seat approximately 18 inches high) that they are not using or wanting, we would be happy to use it at preschool.

The piano fits in well with our new furniture, including a new lounge, shelving and some different shaped and sized tables. Our preschool looks great and feels very 'homey' and comfortable. We are looking forward to getting our new lockers that are currently being built by Stuart Peart at Castlereagh Cabinets: we will soon look and feel like a whole new preschool!



Our Bush Preschool programme continues this term, every second week. At the end of last term we explored Tooraweenah creek area near the bridge, where the children were very busy working together and building a very intricate "fairy forest" using a range of things from nature they found nearby, including large sticks, flat stones, grasses, branches, leaves and even some flowers. All of the children worked on this project so they were keen to see if it was still in place as we left it. We discovered that we could see it from the road when we drove over the bridge, but when we went there, we discovered that it seems to have 'grown' since we built it! Maybe the fairies have done this? Our 'stone statues' that we build, similar to the Inukshuks in Canada that we talked about, were still there and we also got busy building together using some sticks and lots of bark that we found around some old logs. It was interesting to see and chat about

other things we discovered that had changed in this area from the recent rain and storms. We were really lucky that the weather held out so we could enjoy Bush Preschool on such a cold winters day and week.



We have been talking about our recent holidays and enjoyed a new 'ocean tray' with lots of marvellous treasures that Miss Shannon brought to preschool. The children have enjoyed sorting these things into groups as well as investigating them further, especially the cuttle fish. We've started some Paper Mache projects with Miss Sarah and talked further about our farms and what animals are on our farms. We've looked at lots of different stones and gems from under the ground with Miss Marie and some friends have even built some of the 'mining tools' with our various constructions.

Hints From The Dog House! With Brendan Butler



Any stockman worth his salt will appreciate the value of a competent work dog in the yards at shearing, crutching or

any other job that requires a lot of pressure on the stock to keep them moving or packed up tight for ease of handling.

While a good yard dog can save lots of man-hours and energy on our part it can be very stressful and tough on our dogs as well and we need to be mindful of what we are asking them to do. Being able to back the sheep is one of the quickest ways for the dog to be able to get around a tight yard or race and can save everyone a lot of energy, but how do we teach them to want to get up on their backs. First of all the dog needs to be mature enough to handle the tough going, so at least 8 months or


older and have the right temperament and keenness for this style of work. A dog that's unsure in a yard situation needs to be bought in gradually and build up its confidence or it can be easily put off.

Next we want a race setup with woolly sheep packed up tight together so that the young dog can grip their backs and doesn't have the risk of falling down amongst the sheep and getting hurt. We want a bit of free room at the back of the race so the dog has some room when it gets back off the sheep and needs to be on a short leash so we have good control of the dog.

First step is to lift the dog up onto the back of the rear sheep until the dog relaxes then we let it jump back down. We keep repeating this drill, each time moving the dog further up the race, giving it enough time to relax and then it has to move further over the sheep to

get back off. The getting off the sheep is the dogs escape route so it quickly learns that it can get over the back of the sheep to get down to safety. Once the dog is skipping over their backs to get off we can start to make the dog get up by a combination of coaxing, praise and putting pressure on the leash as we pull it up. Soon the dog realises it is easier to get up itself than be pulled and it gets a reward of praise and affection when it gets up.

Once the dog will get up itself, reverse the first procedure and get it moving gradually further forward, relax then let it get back off, eventually running the dog along the length of the race and back off again on the leash. Once the dog is doing this comfortably you can drop the leash and start to send the dog forward, again a bit further each time as the dog gets more comfortable and confident. 
